DCAA BOARD OF DIRECTORS' UPDATE

The DCAA Board of Directors has continued to work on the execution of its Strategic Plan. With the establishment of four special alumni teams and a focus on Indigenous, International, Business and Special Projects, together with the Advancement and Alumni Relations team, the following projects were launched or developed further:

INTERNATIONAL ALUMNI

The International Alumni LinkedIn group has grown to more than 380 members and steps are being taken to establish an international alumni database to assist with communication for programs and activities of interest.

INDIGENOUS ALUMNI

In addition to the first Fall Feast organized by the Indigenous Alumni Network and First Peoples Indigenous Centre, smudge kits were handed out to Indigenous grads at Fall and Spring Convocation.

BUSINESS

Preliminary research was completed for creating an alumni engagement campaign leveraging video content to capture alumni at work as well as showcase alumni events and activities.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

This group has begun collaborating with The Barrett Centre of Innovation in Sustainable Urban Agriculture, W. Galen Weston Centre for Food, Campus Health & Wellness Centre, Social Impact Hub and DC Student Association to investigate opportunities to address food insecurity for students and grow culturally appropriate food for international students.

ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT PLAN

The Alumni Engagement Task Force was established in Fall 2023 and several meetings were held to determine stakeholders for alumni connections. A two-day workshop led by EAi was held November 2 and 3 to review results of the alumni survey and determine next steps for establishing the Alumni Engagement Plan.

2025-2028 DCAA STRATEGIC PLAN

Work will begin in Fall 2024 to develop the next three-year plan. An alumni focus group will be established to provide input during this process. The 2025-2028 DCAA Strategic Plan will incorporate the Alumni Engagement Plan.



ALUMNI OUTREACH



ALUMNI INITIATIVES

The DCAA Board of Directors and DC's Advancement and Alumni Relations team work diligently each year to proactively engage with alumni and our communities to build opportunities for connection and directly support the success of future graduates.

- » Relaunched the Alumni enewsletter, which is sent to nearly 50,000 subscribers each month and includes college news, alumni success stories, and information about alumni events and perks.
- » To help students transition to the workforce, a total of 54 mentees from eight programs were matched as part of the Alumni Mentoring Program.
- » More than 100 alumni guest speakers returned to the classroom to share their career experience and advice with current students.
- » Presented 16 DCAA Leaders of the Future Awards to graduating students who demonstrated consistent and outstanding leadership through a variety of means, including enhancing the student life experience for their peers, acting on behalf of other students to create positive change, motivating others to become engaged in campus life, and demonstrating care for others by encouraging divergent viewpoints and multiple perspectives.
- Established in 2024, the DCAA CICE Outstanding Graduate Award recognized two students from the Community Integration through Cooperative Education (CICE) program in the 2023-24 year who have displayed a commitment to making a positive impact on the program inside and outside of the classroom.
- » DCAA provided matching funding of \$10,000 to support the Food Insecurity Bursary, providing immediate assistance to students who are navigating unforeseen financial challenges.
- » DCAA provided matching funding of \$10,000 to support the Student Experience Fund, enhancing opportunities for students to hone new skills by helping DC refresh, expand, and acquire innovative equipment and technology.
- » Hosted the first Fall Feast for Indigenous students and grads organized by the Indigenous Alumni Network and First Peoples Indigenous Centre.
- » Partnered with DC Athletics to find new ways to celebrate alumni athletes through sponsorship of events, including the Justice Games, alumni tournaments and cross-promotion.
- » Welcomed Prachi Verma as Student Representative on the DCAA Board of Directors.
- The DCAA supported three new events this year, including the AI in Action conference organized by the AI Hub where a first-time award sponsored by DCAA was presented by DCAA Board Director Patrick Lyver to alumnus, Sharath Kumar Prabhu. In the spring Jesara Holla, Vice President 2 on the DCAA Board of Directors, brought remarks at the second-annual Boujee Bites organized by Oshawa Tourism where community members enjoyed samples from local restaurants including Bistro '67. The DCAA also celebrated our honorary alumni at the DC Retirees Association 20th anniversary celebration, featuring alumnus guest speaker, Brent Lessard.

2024 NEW GRAD GUIDE

During Spring Convocation nearly 5,000 career-ready graduates crossed the stage to receive their degrees, diplomas and certificates.

Included in their graduation packages was access to the updated New Grad Guide, which welcomes members to the DCAA and gives them all the information they need to start leveraging the benefits of being a DC alum. Students graduating in the fall will also receive this publication.



DC ALUMNI CONNECT APP

Originally launched in 2018, the DC Alumni Connect app continues to grow, making it easy to find alumni news, perks and contests. Alumni can access discounts on attractions, restaurants, services and shopping with **more than 100 alumni perks**. Also on the app is the DC Alumni Marketplace, allowing users to browse alumni-owned businesses or add their own.

OPPORTUNITIES TO CONNECT, INSPIRE AND CELEBRATE

The Durham College Alumni Association (DCAA) hosts a wide variety of events each year. From family-friendly events to on-campus opportunities for professional development and inspiration, the goal is to continually evolve DCAA's calendar of events to provide a diverse range of options to the DCAA membership.

2023 DCAA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (AGM)

In addition to presenting the DCAA Annual Report, this event gives attendees an opportunity to connect with the DCAA Board of Directors, celebrate leadership award winners and socialize with fellow alum.

"The AGM is not only an alumni event to review the business operation of the alumni association but a wonderful opportunity to connect with other alumni and return to the campus to see and learn about new facilities and programs," said Sally Hillis, Senior Alumni Development Officer, DC. "Durham College, your alma mater, continues to lead the way in innovation and transformative education."

APPRENTICESHIP CELEBRATIONS

Graduates from the Apprenticeship programs are unique in that they are with the college for a short period of time and specific purpose. In 2022, alumni staff partnered with faculty to coordinate a graduation celebration for various apprenticeship programs throughout the academic year. This year, graduates were recognized at eight celebrations.

DC TALKS: ALUMNI SERIES

A hybrid event series held in The Rotary Global Classroom at DC's Oshawa campus, the DC Talks: Alumni Series invites alumni speakers from across the globe to share their career journeys and industry insights.

In November, GenAI: The Power of Infinite Possibilities welcomed DC graduates Roop Gill ('20 Chemical Laboratory Technician); Shane Graham ('13 Computer Programmer Analyst); Tejas Vyas ('21 Artificial Intelligence Analysis); and special guest Amanda Maknyik, Associate Dean of Teaching Learning and Program Quality at DC, to help attendees learn more about GenAl and its impact on the workplace and society.

During February's event, attendees celebrated The Chronicle's 50th anniversary and recognized a half-century of quality journalism from DC's campus publication. Six alumni of the Journalism program took part in a wide-ranging panel discussion. They shared stories from their time in journalism and related fields, reflected on the immense changes the industry has faced, and offered advice to today's students who are preparing for their own careers.

"We are celebrating journalism in this room today," said Professor Lon Appleby. "Who are the people who keep our leaders on their toes? Who are the ones that reflect our society back to us in the most truthful and dedicated way? Who are the fourth estate in our society? Journalists."

TORONTO BLUE JAYS COLLEGE NIGHT

More than 650 alumni, students and DC employees attended the Toronto Blue Jays College Night in September to cheer on the Jays and show their DC pride with limited edition DC gear including a Blue Jays/DC baseball cap. This event was organized by DC and the Durham College Student Association (DCSA).

FINALS FUEL FEST

New in 2023, Finals Fuel Fest is a partnership with the DCSA. During this event Advancement and Alumni Relations team members visit both the Oshawa and Whitby campuses to connect with current students and provide them with the fuel they need to crush their finals, including treats from Crave Doughnuts – a community favourite and alumni-owned business.

ALUMNI AT WORK

The Advancement and Alumni Relations team are bringing the alumni event experience on the road by visiting companies and organizations that hire a high percentage of DC grads. This event series provides an opportunity to celebrate great DC partners in industry as well as educate alumni about the benefits available to them as a DC grad. In the spring, this series was launched starting right here on campus, welcoming all DC employees who are also grads to enjoy lunch and connect with each other in the Centre for Innovation and Research.

ALUMNI END OF SUMMER BBQ

In its second year, this summer event is quickly becoming a fan favourite among alumni. On August 21 nearly 200 alumni and their friends and family returned to DC's Oshawa campus to enjoy a BBQ, outdoor games and cool treats. This year's event also featured a photo booth and caricature artist.

JEREMY BURNS & AARON DALE

Building on their college education and military service, Toronto police officers Jeremy Burns and Aaron Dale co-founded the Military Veterans Wellness Program (MVWP), designed to help law enforcement members support veterans in crisis. MVWP has been endorsed by organizations including Veterans Affairs Canada, National Defence's Canadian Armed Forces Transition Group, Royal Canadian Legion, and is now part of mandatory training for Toronto police officers.



CHRIS CULL

Founder of Inspire By Example, Chris Cull is a motivational speaker and filmmaker who uses his experience as a recovering opioid user to advocate for mental health and addiction recovery. He has cycled across Canada twice and produced two films to raise awareness and educate the public, transforming many lives. Chris has shared his expertise at numerous notable events, including the United Nations Commission on Narcotic Drugs.



SHELBY NELSON

With a love for sports and community, Shelby Nelson, has dedicated 24 years to the Toronto Blue Jays organization. With a DC education as a foundation, Shelby's career trajectory has seen him rise to Vice President of Florida Operations where he leads a team responsible for Spring Training, the Dunedin Blue Jays, and the Player Development Complex. As the local face of the Blue Jays in Dunedin, Shelby is a respected community leader and a champion of diversity.



PAULA SOJO

At the age of 18, Paula Sojo was diagnosed with a severe case of Crohn's disease, resulting in 17 surgeries and a permanent ostomy. Determined to help others, she teamed up with her brother to found Ostome Fashion, a thriving business that provides fashionable and empowering options to all ostomy users. With help from family, friends and mentors, she has not only changed her life, but promoted representation and acceptance and empowered her community.





SHELBY NELSON, SPORT ADMINISTRATION CLASS OF 2000

With a love for sports and community, Shelby Nelson, a 2000 Sport Administration graduate, has dedicated 24 years to the Toronto Blue Jays organization. Beginning as an Account Executive, Shelby's career trajectory has seen him rise to Vice President of Florida Operations where he leads a team responsible for Spring Training, the Dunedin Blue Jays, and the Player Development Complex.

Shelby's vision and leadership were crucial in the development of the world-class Player Development Complex and renovating TD Ballpark in Dunedin Florida. In addition to building partnerships with government to move the project forward, his collaboration with architects and management through construction phases—particularly during the pandemic—demonstrated his adeptness at navigating complex challenges. As one of the driving forces behind the project, Shelby's work is a significant contribution to the sport and the community. The Blue Jays new Player Development Complex is recognized as the best in Major League Baseball.

The local face of the Blue Jays in Dunedin, Shelby is a respected community leader, actively participating in various local charities and groups and coaching kids' sports. In recognition of his long-time contributions to baseball in Dunedin, he was inducted to the City's baseball Hall of Fame. Shelby's commitment to his alma mater is evident through student placement opportunities, hiring graduates, and participating in the DC Talks: Alumni Series.

2024 ALUMNI OF DISTINCTION RECIPIENT ADAM RUPPEL, BUSINESS — HUMAN RESOURCES CLASS OF 1997

Adam Ruppel's passion, creativity and dedication have transformed the events industry. A 1997 graduate in Business – Human Resources, he began his career in event management from the corner of his bedroom, founding Chico Racing. For the past 30 years, Adam has been at the helm of this company, producing the largest 24-hour mountain bike event in North America, the 24 Hours of Summer Solstice, held at Albion Hills Conservation Area.

He co-founded Mudhero under Crazy Canuck Events in 2011, quickly establishing it as Canada's largest obstacle race, with 40 events and over 300,000 participants. In 2018, he sold the business and shifted his focus to the automotive industry where he continued to thrive.

In 2021, Adam co-founded the Drive Festival at Canadian Tire Motorsport Park, attracting over 30,000 attendees annually. This three-day outdoor automotive exhibition highlights the latest in car technology and features manufacturer displays, ride-alongs, car collections, clubs, motorcycles, and kid-friendly automotive experiences.

Adam's commitment to community support is evident through charity runs, festivals, and a cycling fundraiser for his local hospital in Uxbridge. He actively gives back to DC by hiring graduates and offering placement opportunities. Adam's contributions have significantly impacted tourism and economic development, establishing Clarington and Durham Region as premier destinations for automotive enthusiasts nationwide.

HOT OFF THE PRESS

- The official Presidential Installation of Dr. Elaine Popp was led by the Board of Governors and held during the first Convocation ceremony on Monday, June 17. Since taking on the role of President on March 1, 2024, Dr. Popp has been guided by her clear vision of DC as a sustainable, future-proof, people-focused, equity-driven and community-connected college that meets the needs of students and anticipates industry expectations.
- » The DCAA is a proud supporter of <u>Enactus DC</u>. For the second year in a row, Enactus DC has been declared one of the Central Regional Champions for its Founders Drive podcast project. This year, DC competed in the Desjardins Youth Empowerment Challenge and presented Founders Drive: Season Two, a global podcast aimed at inspiring young Indigenous entrepreneurs to overcome barriers and become their own bosses.
- » DC's Social Impact Hub helped alumnus Chris Cull launch Surviving Addiction docuseries, which shares different perspectives of those touched by addiction and the humanity behind people's individual experiences.
- » PR News named DC professor and alumna Matisse Hamel-Nelis one of their <u>2023 People of the Year in the Diversity</u>, <u>Equity and Inclusion Champion</u> category, recognizing her tireless commitment to accessibility in communications. In 2024 she made the list again in the Educator category.
- » This spring <u>James Stockwood</u>, former DC men's rugby standout, made his debut with the Canadian men's national rugby team.
- » As co-owner of Oshawa-based All or Nothing Brewhouse, <u>DC alum Jeff Dornan has continued to nurture a relationship with the college</u>, finding new ways to connect and give back. In addition to serving on DC's Board of Governors, Jeff helped launch Durham Lords Ale, with a portion of sales contributing to DC's Student Experience Fund.
- » DC's new, state-of-the-art electric vehicle (EV) lab has been named the <u>Vanhaverbeke Family EV Training Centre</u>, in recognition of the generous support of philanthropists Edmond and Sylvia Vanhaverbeke. The centre educates motive power technicians on EVs with programs centred on hands-on, experiential learning.
- » The remarkable contributions and impact of DC's past President Don Lovisa were formally recognized with the <u>naming of DC's Whitby campus' main building</u>: the <u>Don Lovisa Building</u>.
