LETTER FROM THE DURHAM COLLEGE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT



It has been a year of growth, innovation and excitement for Durham College (DC) and the Durham College Alumni Association (DCAA). With an influx of new graduates in 2019, the alumni membership has grown to over 90,000 making the efforts to keep alumni connected and engaged that much more important. The DCAA and the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs (ODAA) are hard at work with various initiatives and events throughout the year to ensure our alumni membership has opportunities to continue to remain engaged with DC.

- Last fall, we launched a pilot Alumni Mentoring Program in conjunction with the Law Clerk Advanced program students. To assist in the transition from college to career, fourteen alumni mentors were paired with fourteen students giving them a unique opportunity to obtain guidance on career goals, develop networking skills and learn about workplace dynamics.
- In early 2019, the DCAA Board of Directors established a formal partnership with Enactus DC to offer mentorship, coaching and general support of student initiatives from our alumni.
- This past March, we saw the exciting new launch of the DC Connect Mobile App meant to make staying connected after graduation more rewarding with access to over 100 perks and discounts.
- Through the generous support of the RBC Future Launch program, the college recently formed a one-year partnership with 10,000 Coffees to offer an additional mentorship opportunity for alumni and students.
- We continue to provide a variety of opportunities for our alumni to come together such as Alumni Nights at the Generals and Jays games and the first ever Alumni Summer Social hosted at Bistro '67, Whitby campus in August.

We continue to be impressed by the hard work and innovation of our graduates. In particular, this year we recognized Brandon Bird, Cailey Jones and Bev Woods with the 2019 Alumni of Distinction award for their contributions to society and their community.

In closing, I would like to thank our Board and Committee members for volunteering their time in support of the DCAA. In particular, we would like to recognize Elaine Garnett, who will be retiring after six years of dedicated service to the Board. Elaine has been a valued board member, serving as president (2017-2018) and continuing to guide the board as past president this past year. Special thanks to all for your time and expertise!

As the college readies itself for the fall semester, I find myself reflecting on the remarkable year that Durham College (DC) has had. This past December, we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Whitby campus which gave us a chance to look back on how much growth and change DC has had over the years.

In April, our Esports Gaming Arena officially opened. With state-of-the-art gaming systems the Esports Arena is an amazing space where alumni, students and staff can come together to have fun and learn about the Esports industry. This summer, DC's Hub for Applied Research in Artificial Intelligence for Business Solutions hosted the Enable AI Summit, the first conference of its kind in the Durham Region, offering workshops, information and training in AI applications. The Centre for Craft Brewing Innovation made headlines for its valuable contribution to the Ontario craft beer scene through the addition of a beer analysis system that is helping brewers create a consistent, high-quality product.

Our newest green-friendly facility, the Centre for Collaborative Education, achieved Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design® Gold level certification in July, and Bistro '67 was named one of 100 Most Scenic Restaurants in Canada by OpenTable for its stunning views of the W. Galen Weston Centre for Food's agricultural fields and gardens.

To top off a summer of many accomplishments, DC was able to host the first ever Canadian offering of Camp Invention™ a camp dedicated to providing a unique experience for children to learn about science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

As always, the Durham College Alumni Association (DCAA) and the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs are striving to create opportunities for alumni and students to come together and learn from one another. One of these opportunities is the Alumni Mentorship Program (AMP), which was very successful in its pilot year. The AMP offers alumni a chance to share their career experience and expertise to help students who will soon be entering the workforce.

While we look forward to the future, we are also well aware of the accomplishments of our many alumni. 
- Launch of DC Alumni Mobile App to give alumni easy access to exclusive savings at over 100 restaurants, venues and attractions

2019 ALUMNI OF DISTINCTION AWARD RECIPIENTS

The Alumni of Distinction Awards honour the extraordinary contributions DC graduates make to society while achieving career success. This year we welcomed three new Alumni of Distinction including:

Brandon Bird, Alumni of Distinction Award

Level 3 Plumber Apprentice Certificate, 2012

Brandon Bird knew he would need a solid foundation of skills before he could take over leadership of his family's third-generation plumbing and heating company. While he has been working there for 16 years in various roles, he enrolled in Durham College (DC) and completed his Level 3 Plumber Apprentice Certificate in 2012.

A licensed Red Seal plumber, he then returned to the company and continued working his way up the ranks, always looking for ways to grow this business. This included overseeing the acquisition and amalgamation of John McKenzie Plumbing with Bird Mechanical Ltd, allowing the company to offer more services and expand into new markets. In 2016, at just 29 years old, he became the youngest CEO in the company's history.

In 2018 Brandon successfully expanded the current operations into Atlantic Canada, opening the first office in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. Additionally, he acquired a Civil Contracting Company, R.G. MacDuff Contracting Ltd., to work hand-in-hand with Bird Mechanical Ltd. facilitating better project control and targeting different markets.

Since taking the reins Brandon has generated over \$32 million in sales revenue while overseeing a team of over 100 employees, 70 of which are tradespeople. Through strategic expansion and service offerings, the company has worked on projects ranging from \$100,000 to \$20 million; its clients include the Hospital for Sick Children and Cadillac Fairview.

Brandon also chairs DC's Mechanical Techniques – Plumbing Advisory Committee and sits on the Mechanical Contractors Association of Toronto's Education Committee.



Cailey Jones, Alumni of Distinction Award

Early Childhood Education, 2010

Cailey Jones's passion for education has taken her from the classrooms of Durham College (DC) to Johannesburg, South Africa.

After graduating from the college's Early Childhood Education program in 2010, she found herself headed to South Africa for a one-year volunteer opportunity to work with Botshabelo, a non for profit that helps underprivileged children.

While she originally applied to work with infants, Cailey's ECE training made her an ideal candidate to help with establishing the Urban Kids Educentre (UKE), to provide quality preschool education to low-income students. Eight years later she is still living there, now working as the principal of UKE managing a team of 13 employees, teaching 120 students.

She is also using her skills to work towards securing funding for those UKE employees to pursue their own additional education. With a goal to establish partnerships with local universities to have students studying Occupational Therapy, Child Psychology, Art Therapy, Speech Pathology intern at UKE, Cailey hopes it will become a resource centre not only for its students but for other preschools as well.



Bev Woods, Alumni of Distinction Award

Dental Assisting, 1980 and Dental Hygiene, 1986

With a career that spans three decades, Bev Woods has given thousands of people a reason to smile.

Since graduating from Durham College's (DC) Dental Assisting program in 1980 and the Dental Hygiene program in 1986, she has worked in private and public health settings, including owning a dental hygiene practice and serving as program director of dental hygiene for Maxwell College from July 2006 to August 2008. Bev also held a council position with the College of Dental Hygienists of Ontario and was president of the Bay of Quinte Dental Hygienists Society and Ontario Dental Hygienists' Association.

Another hallmark of her career is her commitment to giving back. To ensure no one goes without dental hygiene care, Bev founded Gift from the Heart project (GFTH), a day set aside for registered dental hygienists across Canada to share their skills, knowledge and compassion with those who need it the most, Canadians who experience barriers accessing oral health services. To date, over \$1.4 million in dental hygiene care has been provided at no cost to the client.

2019 PREMIER'S AWARD NOMINEES

Cailey Jones

Early Childhood Education, 2010

Over the last ten years, Cailey Jones has worked her way up from volunteer to full-time teacher, vice-principal and finally principal of Botshabelo Urban Kids Educentre (UKE) in Midrand, South Africa. Today, she manages a team of 13 staff and provides up to 120 low-income preschool students, ages 3 to 6, with a high-quality education every year.

Driven by the knowledge that early access to education can change a child's life, Jones has helped build Botshabelo's preschool program from the ground up, filling a need for children who may not otherwise access preschool education. There, she's introduced play-based learning, parent workshops, standardized assessment processes, and regular teacher evaluations and training. She is also using her skills to work towards securing funding for those UKE employees to pursue their own additional education.

With a goal to establish partnerships with local universities to have students studying Occupational Therapy, Child Psychology, Art Therapy, Speech Pathology intern at UKE, Cailey hopes it will become a resource centre not only for its students but for other preschools as well. In 2019, she was recognized as a Durham College Alumna of Distinction and was a guest speaker during the college's Global Grad event.



Beverley Woods

Dental Assisting, 1980 and Dental Hygiene, 1986

Andrew Popko

Public Relations, 1987

Andy Popko has spent over 40 years in the oil and energy sector working closely with western Canada's Indigenous peoples to develop equitable joint venture partnerships that will protect Indigenous land rights. In 1997, Popko established the Aboriginal Relations department within Encana Corporation's North American oil and gas division, becoming vice-president of Aboriginal Relations.

Under his leadership, Encana was the first company to bring together four northeastern Alberta First Nations bands to jointly own and operate a new drilling rig in 2001. For this work, Popko was named an honorary Chief at Heart Lake First Nations and also won a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Tribal Chiefs Institute in 2003. Presented on behalf of the Treaty 6 Chiefs, Popko is the first non-Indigenous person to be presented with the award. He was also recognized as a Durham College Alumnus of Distinction in 2004.

During his tenure at Encana, Popko and his team were able to broker more than 50 joint venture opportunities for Indigenous peoples in the area. In 2004, he was selected for an 18-month secondment at the Privy Council Office in Ottawa, Ont. to consult with Prime Minister Paul Martin, provincial premiers and five national Indigenous organizations on the Kelowna Accord.

Today, Popko is vice-president of Aboriginal Relations at NC Services Group Limited and a director at energy startup Bitcrude, a company that has the technology to move solid bitumen from Alberta Athabasca tar sands to international markets without having to use pipeline.



CAMPUS NEWS

WHITBY CAMPUS CELEBRATES 25TH ANNIVERSARY

On December 12, Durham College (DC) celebrated its Whitby campus's 25th anniversary surrounded by employees, alumni, corporate partners, donors and local politicians. Once a Cadbury chocolate factory, DC purchased the property in 1992 and began the process of turning its vision for a training facility, focused primarily on skilled trades, into a reality. Home to more than 2000 post-secondary skilled-trade students, 1300 skilled-trade apprentices (which includes 150 high school level Ontario Youth Apprentices), 1000 post-secondary students pursuing non-trades studies and 1,000s' of other part-time students and corporate training clients through the college's School of Continuing Education and Corporate Training Services, the Whitby campus provides numerous opportunities for experiential learning.

ESPORTS GAMING ARENA OPENING

On April 2, DC officially opened a first-of-its-kind Esports Gaming Arena. Located in the Student Centre at the college's Oshawa campus, the 3,000-sq-ft. venue is unique from any other collegiate gaming space in Canada thanks to its extensive broadcast capabilities and lounge area that can hold up to 120 spectators for esports tournaments. The Esports Gaming Arena is part of DC's four-part esports plan which also includes the Durham Lords esports varsity team, which began competing with teams across North America in 2018, a recreational gaming club and integration of esports into the college's post-secondary program curricula.


DC PLANTS TREES AS PART OF HIGHWAY OF HEROES TREE CAMPAIGN

On June 20, DC held a commemorative ceremony to plant hero trees at its Whitby campus, as part of the Highway of Heroes Tree Campaign. Created with a mission to plant two million trees along and within the communities adjacent to the 401 Highway of Heroes, the campaign is a living tribute to the members of the country's Armed Forces, including DC alumni and the 117,000 men and women who died in conflicts since Confederation. College employees joined DC President Don Lovisa, along with the Lords women's varsity softball team and Mike Hurley, executive director of the Highway of Heroes Tree Campaign, to plant the first tree.

DC HOSTS NATIONAL INVENTORS HALL OF FAME RECEPTION CAMP INVENTION

DC hosted several dignitaries from the government, educational and corporate sectors on July 10 for the National Inventors Hall of Fame™ (NIHF) Reception. During the event, guests took a tour of the first-ever Canadian offering of Camp Invention™ and spoke with camp educators and participants of the non-profit summer enrichment program. Camp Invention, held at the DC Oshawa campus from July 8 to 12, is a program developed by the non-profit NIHF, in partnership with the United States Patent and Trademark Office and provides a unique experience for children to learn about science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Shelley Jones, DC Alumna of Distinction and Vice-president (Canada) at National Inventors Hall of Fame helped to facilitate this important event.
