Message from the president

It may be chilly, but the cold weather hasn't slowed us down; staff, faculty and students are busier than ever. Work has even begun on Durham College's (DC) 50th anniversary celebration, which we will mark in 2017, alongside other colleges across Ontario. This momentous occasion also coincides with Canada's 150th birthday so we're in good company. The anniversary may seem far away, but as we consider DC's rich history, we're dedicating ample time and energy into the planning and execution of a celebration worthy of this amazing milestone.

There have been a lot of changes at the college in its nearly 50 years. When DC first opened its doors in 1967 it had 205 students and they attended classes in 16 portables. You only have to look at our campuses today to see the extensive changes and growth we have gone through. In fact, DC continues to lead the Ontario college system in growth, with enrolment increasing 61 per cent over the past six years.

In preparation for our 50th anniversary, a working committee has been established under the leadership of Scott Blakey, vice-president,

As the college has grown, so too has the need for greater student support. In an ongoing effort to put the student experience first, DC recently honoured our hard-working scholarship and bursary recipients and donors at a special recognition evening, held at Bistro '67 and the Centre for Food.

The college also achieved record-breaking results for its Food Drive this year thanks to the efforts of staff, faculty, students and volunteers from DC and UOIT, and the DC Alumni Association, in partnership with the Student Association and the Kinsmen Club of Oshawa. Student need for assistance has doubled in recent years and the entire DC community stepped up; a total of \$42,000 was raised, benefiting 172 students and their families, including 218 children.

Student support is such an important part of what we do at the college and our grads play a huge role in making DC what it is today.

As we prepare to celebrate where we've been, we're also eagerly anticipating the future and looking forward to all our alumni being a key part of it.

Durham College and partners launch FastStart program

DC ALUMNI INVITED TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS GREAT OPPORTUNITY

Durham College (DC), with the University of Ontario Institute of Technology (UOIT), Fleming College and Trent University, recently announced that the four organizations are working with Spark Centre and the Greater Peterborough Innovation Cluster (GPIC), on the new FastStart program (FastStart), a powerful new resource designed to help university and college students and graduates acquire entrepreneurial skills and convert innovative business ideas into successful companies.

FastStart is an entrepreneurial training partnership designed to increase the entrepreneurship skills and awareness of university and college students, and help them develop solid business plans and take products to market. It is being funded through an \$800,000 Government of Ontario grant being shared equally among all four post-secondary institutions under the province's \$5-million On-Campus Entrepreneurship Activities (OCEA) program, managed by Ontario Centres of Excellence (OCE).



FASTSTART FEATURES INCLUDE:

- Availability to students at all four institutions, in all fields of study, including graduates and youth in the community with an entrepreneurial spirit.
- Customized services to help participants refine their ideas, build teams and prepare solid business plans to deliver products to market.
- Programs such as boot camps and student incubators.
- Progressive, more focused programs to students with demonstrated interest and ability.
- Opportunities for students and graduates to transition through FastStart to the Spark Centre, GPIC or local business access development centres where they can access additional services to help them quickly advance and launch their businesses.

The OCEA program is part of Ontario's Youth Jobs Strategy, which is seeing the province invest \$295 million over two years to help 30,000 more youth from across the province connect with the tools, experiences and entrepreneurial support they need to find employment or start their own businesses.

Funded by the Government of Ontario, the Ontario Network of Entrepreneurs (ONE) is Ontario's innovation system. The ONE is made up of regional and sector-focused organizations designed to help Ontario-based entrepreneurs rapidly grow their companies and create jobs.

Examples of other projects up for consideration include: finding support to purchase additional microwaves to help reduce lineups during busy lunch periods when students have limited time between classes and additional computer charging stations for students.

DC alumni show school spirit to cheer on Oshawa Generals at sold-out Alumni Night



Pathway to degree from DC to Ireland

Durham College (DC) offers more than 450 pathway-to-degree options for students including a pathway agreement with the Institutes of Technology Ireland (IOTI), a representative body for 13 institutes of technology in Ireland. The agreement provides an opportunity for graduates of specific two-and three-year Ontario college programs to earn an honours degree abroad, in some cases earning the degree with only one additional year of study.

Jessamyn Adams, a DC Accounting – Business Administration graduate, is one such student that has taken advantage of this unique opportunity as she completed a Bachelors of Business – Accounting and Finance at the Institute of Technology – Blanchardstown in Dublin, Ireland following her time at DC.

"When I read I could obtain my degree in only one further year of study rather than the two I would need in Ontario, I thought I should at least apply," said Adams. "ITB offered me the most generous exemptions for the diploma I had already completed and even though I had


never been to Ireland I knew it as somewhere I wanted to explore and what better way than to live there."

The pathways agreement with DC was developed between IOTI and Colleges Ontario, an advocacy organization for Ontario's 24 community colleges. The agreement primarily pertains to programs within the schools of Business, IT & Management and Science & Engineering Technology (SET), offering students the chance to further their post-secondary education abroad while experiencing one of the world's most dynamic and lively countries.

"My experience working with the Irish Institutes enabling students to further their education abroad has been excellent," said Susan Todd, dean of SET. "Many Canadian students now have the opportunity to transfer their college credits to obtain a degree in a beautiful English-speaking country, which will broaden their horizons both culturally and academically."

Support abounds for students looking to take advantage of the pathway opportunity. "Start to finish they made my transition to Ireland so great," said Adams. "Once I accepted, I was put in contact with an international officer and he answered my incessant questions from everything to do with my courses to where I was going to live and how to get around."

Students can visit Colleges Ontario for background information on the agreement itself, in addition to the IOTI website, which offers additional information on specific academic bridging requirements per program/institution. It was a rapid start to the season with the Durham Lords hitting the courts in succession with men's and women's volleyball, and men's and women's basketball.

The women's volleyball team was lobbed right into play for the 27th Annual Adidas Cup. On January 2 and 3, 12 teams from across Ontario were invited to participate in the tournament hosted by the college at the Campus Recreation and Wellness Centre (CRWC). The Lords took fifth place with a 2-0 win against Canadore College while Sheridan College took the gold in a 2-0 game against St. Clair College. They will look to enter the Ontario Colleges Athletic Association (OCAA) Volleyball Championship with a win in the qualifying round.

Off the court, the women's team was spreading good karma by serving the community before the holidays. They held a fundraiser to collect unwrapped toys and non-perishable food items to help support the organization in meeting the needs of women, children, youth and families for YWCA Durham. Go Lords!

The men's volleyball team has been unstoppable this season as they sport a perfect 16-0 conference record and are the lone undefeated team in the OCAA. The Lords' strong performance has made them a mainstay in the Canadian Collegiate Athletic Association (CCAA) national rankings, as they sit fourth and are in the polls for the fifth straight week.

After a strong start to 2015, the men's basketball program finds itself back in the national polls as they are 12th overall. Currently standing 12-3, they look to be top contenders for the OCAA Men's Basketball Championship from Friday, March 6 to Sunday, March 8, on home courts at the CRWC. While the women's team is 8 and 6 with only two games remaining until the OCAA Women's Basketball Championship from Thursday, March 5 to Saturday, March 7.

DC hosts Minister of Health Rona Ambrose

With healthy living becoming an increasing priority among students and the local community, Durham College (DC) President Don Lovisa was pleased to host Rona Ambrose, Federal Minister of Health, as she visited the college's Whitby campus on December 16.

The minister and some caucus colleagues joined Lovisa, Dr. Judeline Innocent, dean of the School of Health & Community Services (HCS), and Susan Sproul, recently retired dean for the School of HCS, for a discussion centring on the college's range of clinical-focused health programs – from its newest program, Activation Coordination in Gerontology, to cornerstones including Dental Hygiene and Occupational Therapist Assistant/Physiotherapist Assistant (OTA/PTA) among others – over lunch at Bistro '67 and the Centre for Food (CFF).

"In addition to learning more about our emphasis on practical learning opportunities across all our health programs, the health minister showed great interest in how we train our culinary students to prepare healthy meals and meet the demands of an ever-growing health-conscious food-service market," said Lovisa. "It is always wonderful to be able to showcase the state-of-the-art facilities that Durham College has to offer, and Minister Ambrose was keenly interested in how our facilities provide students with hands-on experience as they work towards meaningful careers."
