Passion Play:

A Path to Indie Gaming

ccording to Ryan Miller, one of the great things about being an independent (indie) developer is the freedom to develop original games. As the co-owner and programmer of *Reptoid Games* in Toronto, Miller has the freedom to run the business the way that suits him and is best for his company as a whole. As an artistic kid with a love of video games and drawing, he turned his passion into his job and now works to create top quality indie games.

"I like indie games," says Miller. "There's a lot to like - the passion and the scrappiness is appealing to me. Indie developers can choose to create whatever game they want because they're not constrained."

Miller graduated from the Computer Animation program at Durham College (DC) in 2007, with a paid internship adding to the mix. After Miller graduated, he continued working in the animation field. He would fill the roles of a background painter and a digital compositor for various animated television shows such as *Disney's Fish Hooks* and *Jake and the Neverland Pirates*. He would later go from student to teacher as an instructor in the animation and game development courses, a role he filled from 2012 to 2015.

Miller went on to start *Reptoid Games* in 2015 and partnered with Simon Paquette, an accomplished animation director in his own right, in an effort to leave their mark on the indie game world. Their big break came during the Ubisoft Indie Series, a game development competition, in February of 2017, where they took home the Grand Prize.

"It was really exciting working with *Ubisoft*, and getting their mentorship and bouncing ideas off each other," says Miller. "I was blown away by the friendliness and generosity of Ubisoft Toronto. Their support and guidance have and will continue to be invaluable to us."

Reptoid Games is focused on creating a good work environment that's comfortable for everyone. This is possible thanks to the desire to treat all of their employees fairly. Miller and Reptoid Games believe in the good treatment of the people who work for them. In fact, it's this philosophy that brought Miller and Paquette together as co-owners. They have both seen employees in the industry treated unfairly and vowed to make a difference.

"The idea of valuing the people you are working with is something we both felt really strongly about," says Paquette. "To

this day, I feel it's one of the strongest points of our partnership and our company."

Miller's key piece of advice for anyone trying to break into the field is to get out there and network. He urges students to go downtown and check out the various industry events and meet people already working in the field.

"Making yourself known, making those connections, and being sociable goes a long way," says Miller. "At the end of the day, a big part of getting a job is who you know."

Miller sees *Reptoid Games* remaining independent for the foreseeable future. His company is more comfortable in an indie space and prefers the freedom indie development provides. The future looks bright for Reptoid Games. Don't be surprised to hear that name more often in the gaming industry.

Reptoid Games recently released their first full-length game, Fossil Hunters. Fossil Hunters is an all-ages action-adventure game about digging up fossils and assembling your own dinosaurs. The game is currently available now on Steam and on all major consoles this summer.

here are many responsibilities that accompany being a student. With busier schedules, bills to pay, and deadlines to meet, most students find this time of their life to be one of the most stressful. After attending Trent University for a bachelors degree in psychology, Lee decided to take a chance on a thorough program, with an eight-month placement, and a job availability that ensured a bright future for herself and her daughter.

"I faced every challenge head on," says Lee. "I had to act fast when challenges came my way because I was not only dealing with working on a career for myself, I was working towards supporting my family."

The obstacles of entering school with a newborn, juggling child care, completing assignments in on time, and working part-time, provided more than enough difficulties. However, it was these hurdles that offered Lee a chance to develop better time and money management skills, and a stronger drive and determination to achieve her goals.

While Lee struggled during her time as a student, she used the resources that Durham College offered, such as daycare, to help her attend classes and stay on track. The biggest support system, though, was her family.

"My family was a very helpful resource," says Lee.
"Having a close family, my parents were always willing to help me as much as they could, that way I could go to the

library at UOIT and study and do assignments."

Thanks to her hard work, she gained immediate employment following the completion of a very successful placement at Lerners LLP, three months prior to finishing school. After graduation in 2007, Lee worked for Lerners LLP for over four years. She then chose to pursue another opportunity, and joined Blouin Dunn LLP, where she worked for three years, and developed even more experience.

Lee is now a Legal Administrative Assistant and Technology Adoption Champion in McMillan's Municipal Law Group in Toronto, and just had her three-year anniversary. After 10 years in the legal industry, she's very happy with her career choice and achievements. Lee now works on training various team members on programs as they are updated and introduced.

After working at three law firms throughout her career, Lee expresses the importance of going with your gut and being happy in your work environment.

Programs such as Accounting and Payroll to Music Business Management and even Welding Engineering Technician are available for students to enroll in. But that doesn't stop Durham College from adding new and exciting programs to the list. In fact, in September 2018, the School of Business, IT and Management will be introducing a program to add to the already long and diverse list of programs.

"This program is directly in response to industry request and so by allowing students to come into the state-ofthe-art facility, brand new program with expert faculty

designing the program, these students will be empowered to grow themselves in discipline but they're also going to get the underlying theme of entrepreneurship in business aptitudes," says Michelle Hutt, Associate Dean of Business, IT and Management. "So they are going to come out ahead of other graduates in the industry. They will also have the pathway to an advanced diploma."

Esthetician – Spa Management will be one of seven new programs in 2018. The Esthetician – Spa Management program will introduce students to the world of nail and hair care. Students will learn how to give manicures, pedicures, different waxing techniques and even make-up corrective techniques and body treatments. With a holistic approach to teaching, students will graduate with

the confidence to take on any client and provide them with fantastic services. "We have a growing economy in the Durham Region, especially Oshawa," says Hutt. "Lots of people having been asking for a program like this one. With the new Centre for Collaborative Education opening we had the opportunity to build a spa."

At the end of the four semester program students will have opportunities to be the owner of a salon or spa, work as a manicurist or pedicurist, become a skincare specialist and even have the skills to work as a hair care and removal specialist.

The two-year program will also provide students with hands on, real life work experience as they work and practice the skills taught in classes at Durham's very own DC Spa which will be open to the public. Along with their very own spa workspace.

This program is directly in response to industry request and so by allowing students to come into the state-of-the-art facility, brand new program with expert faculty designing the program.

"With the new Centre for Collaborative Education opening we had the opportunity to build a spa," says Hutt. "Students will be required to do a field placement which can help them land a job."

urham College (DC) is known for its extensive range of emergency services programs available for those looking to get into the field. For an individual seeking to enroll in the policing program or obtain their graduate certificate in victimology, the college provides the training necessary to kick-start any emergency services career. That's why for Clarice Bouman, a first-year student in the Protection, Security, and Investigation (PSI) program at DC, it was a natural choice.

"My interest in emergency services first started with wanting to be a 911 operator," says Bouman. "After participating in the Youth in Policing Incentive (YIPI) program while in high school, I discovered I wanted to become a police officer. I did my research and discovered that Durham College was the best option with its PSI program. It would provide me with opportunities to bridge into many different aspects of policing down the road."

Now in her second semester, Bouman has discovered a new trend within the program; there's a larger enrollment of female

students in her classes. In recent years, significant strides have been made in the realm for female empowerment across the globe, in part thanks to the #MeToo movement sweeping across Hollywood and the efforts being put into fighting for women's equal pay rights. It is clear the women of the world are coming forward and taking a stand. It's also why it comes as no surprise to Bouman that young women are showing more interest in taking on previously more male-dominated roles and careers.

Bouman noted out of seven professors this semester, five are female, with some still completing work for the police force and others now retired. The surge in young women enrolling in these types of programs seems to be a great response to the female empowerment movement.

In 2016, the National Post published an article discussing the Toronto Police Service and how it is still seen as the 'old boys club'.

With the number of female students in the program, I feel it's going to have a very positive effect in shattering the 'old boys club' stigma attached to not only the police force, but also the many different areas of emergency services, ??

"Being a current PSI student, I feel we will be seeing a surge in female first responders in the years to come, which is just one

> example of how police officers are changing and adapting with the way our society is changing." Bouman stated.

The efforts being made by the Toronto Police Service to have a more diverse and educated police force are ongoing. The changes Bouman sees in the emergency services programs throughout Ontario are sure to have a positive impact on those efforts and initiatives.

"After graduation, I will continue my volunteering and hopefully secure a job that will help me when trying to join the Toronto Police Service," says Bouman. "No matter what aspect of policing

'old boys club' stigma that is attached to the police force."



"I would say my classes are about 55 per cent male and 45 per cent female," says Bouman. "The program has students from many different emergency service programs in the classes, so it changes with each class. But the ladies are beginning to take over and make themselves known."
